Prayer tip from St. Simeon

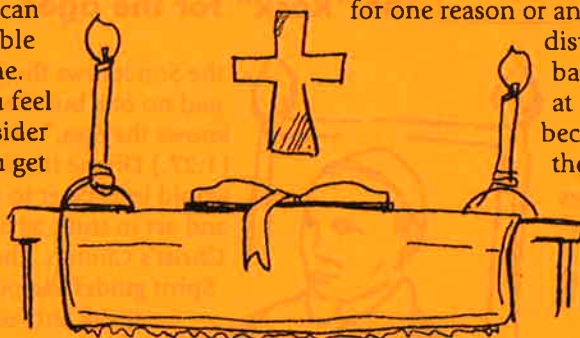
It gives you something to talk about with God. Within the Mass are lots of intriguing, mysterious, or just plain interesting ideas. Listen during the Scripture readings, the responsorial psalm, the homily, or the Eucharistic prayer for something that strikes you and talk with God about it. He'll help open your mind to something new.

You get to help others who are

very far away - without leaving your seat. We all know people we'd like to contact or help in some way but can't for one reason or another. But distances and barriers disappear at Mass. When Jesus becomes present in the Eucharist, the entire Body of Christ is present. So you can pray for anyone and everyone you

would like to support in some way and the entire Body prays with you.

Mass is a great place to make a change. Find at least one idea within the Mass that makes sense and seems possible and put it into practice. Whether it's increasing time in daily prayer, visiting the sick, extending forgiveness - one simple idea can change your life.

10 easy ways to be kind

Perhaps we can inspire others to be more kind by showing kindness ourselves. Consider these suggestions:

1. **Talk to strangers**, especially people different from you. You may become a friend.
2. **Fast from unkind words**. Use your words to bless, heal, or bring peace.
3. **Let cars go in front of you in traffic**. Let someone go in front of you in line at the grocery store.
4. If someone makes you mad, leave her a flower anonymously each day until you are



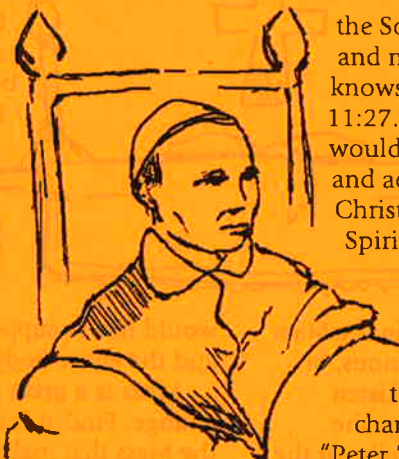
over it.

5. **Light a candle every Sunday** and pray for someone different each time.
6. **Pick up every penny you see** and put it in the Poor Box in your church. (You'll be surprised at how it adds up.)
7. **Open the door for someone**.
8. **Choose a picture or an article from the newspaper** and pray for the people involved.
9. **Put a quarter in an expired parking meter**.
10. **Take someone with whom you disagree to coffee** and listen more than you talk.

from Scripture

Matthew 16:13-19 The "Rock" for the ages

The events in this passage lay the foundations for the Catholic Church. In it, Jesus asked his disciples who people say he was. Then he asked them, "Who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered for the group and identified Jesus as the Son of God. This highlighted Peter's role as spokesperson for the disciples.



the Son knows the Father, and no one but the Father knows the Son," Matthew 11:27.) Divine inspiration would lead Peter to speak and act in truth as head of Christ's Church. The Holy Spirit guides the pope to speak and act in truth today.

Jesus pointed out that it was only by inspiration from the Father that Peter was able to recognize the truth about Jesus. ("No one but

The Church has to last until the end of time. When Jesus changed Simon's name to "Peter," he signaled that he was building his Church on "rock," a solid foundation upon which a wise man will build his home (Matthew 7:24).

Feasts & Celebrations

June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The image of Jesus with his flaming heart exposed is a reminder of his intense and eternal love for us.

June 5 - St. Boniface (754). Called the Apostle of Germany, St. Boniface was a monk dedicated to spreading the Gospel in Germany. He converted many to Christianity and was instrumental in restoring dioceses in Bavaria, Thuringia, and Franconia.

June 11 - St. Barnabas (1st Century). The Apostles changed his

name from Joseph to Barnabas, which means "son of encouragement" because he sold his property and gave the much needed funds to the Jerusalem community. He accompanied St. Paul on his first evangelical journey.

June 24 - Nativity of St. John the Baptist. The only saint whose birth and death we observe, St. John was Jesus' cousin. He baptized and prepared the people for Jesus' saving mission. He even baptized Jesus and was later executed for denouncing Herod's marriage to his sister-in-law.



Q & A What is the difference between mortal and venial sin?

Think of it this way ... all illnesses make your body sick. Some can kill you, while others just make you miserable for a while. All need healing.

The same can be said of sin. Some sins can cause us to lose our eternal lives while others merely delay our entry into Heaven.

The Church makes a distinction between mortal and venial sins. Mortal sin is a deliberate turning away from God and his laws. To be considered a mortal sin, it must be a grave or serious choice against God, and the sinner must be aware of how bad it is but choose to do it anyway.

On the other hand, venial sin is falling short of our obligations to God and each other without completely turning from God. It's like loitering on the road to Heaven versus taking one that leads away from it.

The good news is that no matter how lost we get, God will always take us back through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).
